From the Principal

First, a bracha to all of our DHR families: May Hashem keep all of you healthy and may COVID-19 never interrupt your simcha/ holiday plans ever again! We truly appreciate how careful and sensitive our parents and teachers have been in dealing with this pandemic and its far-reaching effects.

I recently read a dvar Torah from R' Mordy Friedman in which he points out that usually, the Rambam starts each holiday section with the basic laws pertaining to that holiday. However, Hilchos Chanukah begins in a way that is unique and unusual.

Instead, the Rambam opens Hilchos Chanukah with a detailed description of the history of the second Bais HaMikdash leading up to the revolt of the Chashmonaim. All of the historical details are included: Hellenism, the decrees, the rebellion of the Macabees, and the miracle of the oil. At the end of the extensive overview, the Rambam discusses the halachos of candle lighting.

As we know, the Rambam's Mishna Torah is a corpus of laws, books of practical halacha – not stories. What place does the thrilling Chanuka story have in a law book? The Rambam doesn't even tell the Purim or Pesach stories!

It seems that the Rambam is coming to teach us a very important halacha through the Chanuka story: "He is telling us that when a Jew has to act, he or she has to do everything possible. This message emerges from every aspect of the Chashmonaim's story. First, as we say in Al Hanisim, they waged a war of "few against many," they were the "weak against the strong," etc. Yet, they fought and battled bravely, doing everything humanly possible to defeat the Syrian-Greeks despite the odds. Second, after the war, when they returned to the Bais HaMikdash, they searched frantically to find pure oil. They refused to compromise and use impure oil, and did everything humanly possible to find pure oil.

The Chashmonaim did anything and everything humanly possible. Then, once the Chashmonaim did all they could, Hashem responded and helped them. When they fought their hardest against the enemies, Hashem made them victorious. When they searched frantically for pure oil, they found oil. And when they ran out of oil, the oil miraculously lasted for eight days."

As we celebrate Chanuka, we are, once again, in the shadow of the "Substantial Equivalency" issue being decided by New York State's Education Department. I was invited and participated in a meeting with the Commissioner and Board of Regents on this issue, and they will be reaching out to several of our parents and students for input. Hopefully, they will not try to again overstep their bounds and impose their draconian anti-Torah standards (which are significantly lower than what we currently offer to our students) upon our schools. At this point, they are still holding meetings with stakeholders, but we will keep you informed when we hear of any additional developments and if parental involvement is needed.
