# From the Principal

As kids, when Mother's Day would approach, my mother would say, "every day is Mother's Day and Father's Day"! Of course, she was right (because mothers are always right, and because the American concept of choosing just one day to honor parents is misguided)!

The Gemara (Kiddushin, 31a) describes that the nations of the world came to appreciate the beauty of the Torah as a result of this mitzvah. The classic cases presented in the Talmud to demonstrate the lengths to which one must go in observing this mitzvah are those involving non-Jews. Even Eisav was praised for his performance of this mitzvah. Yet, the Talmud (Yerushalmi, Peah 1:1) regards it as one of the most difficult mitzvos to perform properly. What's so special and unique about the mitzvah to honor parents?

It's tempting to think that honoring parents is some kind of payback for all those years of changing diapers and paying tuition. However, this mitzvah was given to the generation who wandered in the desert for 40 years, where Hashem provided for everyone's needs. According to the Midrash Rabba (Shir HaShirim, 4:2), the parents didn't feed their children; they had the mann to eat. Parents didn't provide clothing; the clothes grew with them and never needed washing. Yet, it was precisely this generation that stood at Har Sinai and received the mitzvah to "Honor your father and mother."

We can derive a fascinating lesson from this: This mitzvah of honoring parents does not depend on what your parents do for you, or even if they are "good" parents. Rather, according to the Meshech Chachma (V'eschanan), we honor parents because we are forever indebted to them for giving us the gift of life!

The previous page of the Gemara listed above (Kiddushin, 30b) teaches that there are three partners in the formation of a person: father, mother, and Hashem. If we must show gratitude to our parents for the gift of life, how much more so should we be grateful to Hashem for creating and sustaining the entire world?!

The Sefer HaChinuch (33) points out that by honoring those who brought us into existence, we learn not to take things for granted and to develop an appreciation for the kindnesses that are done for us. As time marches on and society "progresses", there is a tendency for children to feel more advanced, more tech savvy or more capable than their parents. But in Jewish consciousness, parents are to be respected because they are the source of our mesorah, our tradition. In other words, parents not only give us life in this world, but, according to the Abarbanel (Yisro, 20:12) they are the link that connects us to eternity.
